## **Summer exams update from the Head**

Dear Parents and Carers,

At the time of writing this newsletter (10th November), we have just received notification from the Education Minister of her intention to direct Qualifications Wales that there should be **no end of year exams for GCSE, AS and A level qualifications in 2021**.

The primary reason for the Minister's decision is concern for children to be treated fairly; the time learners will spend in schools and colleges will vary hugely and, in this situation, it is impossible to guarantee a level playing field for exams to take place.

Instead of exams, Welsh Government intends to work with schools and colleges to take forward teacher-managed assessments. These should include assessments that will be externally set and marked, but delivered within a classroom environment under teacher supervision.

The expectation is that these will form the basis for centre-based outcomes which will be linked to an agreed national approach to provide consistency across Wales.

The overriding priority for any approach to qualifications in 2021 is to ensure that learners in exam years develop the knowledge, skills and experience that they need to confidently progress to their next steps – whether that is employment, training or further

and higher education. Removing exams frees up the entire summer term which is normally focused on preparing for and sitting exams, for additional teaching and learning.

A Design and Delivery Advisory Group has been set up and will meet this week, chaired by Geraint Rees. The proposed approach to centre-based outcomes, an appeals process and arrangements for private candidates, will be developed by this group, involving school and college leaders, supported by Welsh Government and advised by Qualifications Wales and WJEC.

It is Welsh Government's intention that this work is finalised in December so that guidance and supporting materials can be in place for the start of the spring term.

We have been reassured by the Minister that the first assessment activities will not need to commence until the latter half of the spring term.

Welsh Government have engaged with universities across the UK and have been assured that this decision will not disadvantage Welsh learners as long as their alternative arrangements are robust and transparent.

The situation for Vocational Qualifications is more complex and will require extra work. Welsh Government officials will continue to support Qualifications Wales as they work closely with other regulators to ensure a pragmatic approach that works in learners' interests and gives them clarity about the way forward.

At this early stage, pupils, parents and teachers across Wales have many questions about precisely how centre-based outcomes will work this year. Will the externally set and marked teacher-managed assessments form a weighted element of the final grade? Or will they just be one piece of a wider range of evidence that teachers can use informally to set pupils' centre-based outcomes? Will the teacher-managed assessments be used to moderate grades suggested by teachers? If so, how? Are teacher-managed assessment questions going to be given to students in all their subjects so they can create model answers that are to be written out in test conditions? What is going to happen about vocational qualifications that do not easily fit the centre-based assessment process?

I will write to you again to update you on progress and provide additional information as soon as it is available. Rest assured, whatever the detail of the final arrangements, we will continue to work tirelessly to ensure <u>all</u> pupils at the school achieve the outcomes they deserve.








## **New Apple Mac Music Suite**

# Welsh Government Covid Update

If you are feeling slightly confused about precisely which regulations apply at the moment, you may find it helpful to visit Welsh Government's regulations FAQ page: https://gov.wales/coronavirus-regulations-guidance

Here are a few noteworthy changes that began to apply from the week beginning 9<sup>th</sup> November. The main things Welsh Government are asking people to do are:

- Stay out of each other's homes, except in very limited circumstances;
- Limit the times you leave your home, and the distance you travel;
- When you do leave home, try and be restrained in how many different people you see. It is better to see the same one or two people regularly than to see lots of different people occasionally;
- maintain social distancing, including outdoors;
- meet people outdoors rather than indoors where possible, even where the law allows you to meet indoors;
- when you meet people you don't live with away from your home, in most circumstances, the absolute maximum number of people meeting should be four (not including any children aged under 11);
- Work from home if you can;
- Wash your hands regularly and follow other advice on hygiene; Self-isolate if you show symptoms of coronavirus or when you are told to do so by NHS Track, Trace, Protect.

# Trin Stephens


We are exceptionally proud of Trin Stephens, one of our talented young artists.



#### **GCSE** results success









## Year 6, apply <u>soon</u>! We're oversubscribed


Llanidloes High School is enjoying a record breaking year. In September this year, the school was oversubscribed by the largest number of pupils on record.

The Bitesize website has been expanded to offer additional online help for students and their parents. New The lessons are supported by new videos, practice tests, educational games and articles. This is a bilingual website and the language can be changed back and forward using the tab on the top left hand side.

### GCSE Pod

GCSEPOD is a comprehensive video resource platform that covers virtually every subject. Though it is intended for GCSE it can be used by all pupils. The videos are scripted by teachers and take no more than three to four minutes to watch. The exams may have been cancelled, but learning remains vital.
